What the waste team can do to support your Eco-Schools Journey

- Help to raise the profile of Waste Education within the school environment.
- Help to bring about a positive change in behaviour towards waste minimisation and management in schools, cascading down and into the home.
- Find ways to develop and enhance the services we offer to schools.
- We can attend/assist at school assemblies, class talks/events and attend Eco Group Meetings.
- There are different Recycling rates and types throughout the city, we can support you to monitor what your school recycles/ wastes and how to work this out.

Local Facts Related to Topic

- Litter is waste in the wrong place and there are many different causes.
- Littering is illegal and you can be fined £80 for throwing down or dropping an item in any open public space.
- Not cleaning up after a dog you are responsible for when it fouls in a public open space is illegal and you can be fined £80 if you do not pick up. In total litter and fly-tipping costs Scotland over £78 million each year.
- £53 million of public money is spent each year on the direct costs of litter and fly-tipping (e.g., clean up, enforcement, education), that is over £1 million a week!
- 80% of marine litter comes from landbased sources, by stopping litter on land we can help prevent it entering water courses and ending up in our seas and oceans.
- Scrapantics have diverted 45 tonnes of waste away from landfill and used this to inspire creative projects across Dundee – help us to make it even more!

Tips and Ideas

There are lots of initiatives for you to get involved with on at a national and local. Including:

- Creating a Litter Prevention Action Plan for your school.
- Gathering data on litter through litter surveys.
- Learn about single use plastic and what alternatives there are.
- Dundee's Take Pride In Your City campaign.
- Clean Up Scotland all year round and their annual spring clean in April and May, and the #2MinuteCleanUp.

- Join Beautiful Scotland and/or the It's Your Neighbourhood scheme.
- Campaign and advocate for less packaging/ single use plastics within your school and wider community, e.g. introduce a swap shop within your school/ have a zero-waste day/ package free week etc.
- As an Eco Group, can you help your school collect recycling or encourage more recycling?

Case Studies

Grove Academy pupils have been improving their local environment, working closely with local groups, such as Broughty Ferry in Bloom and their local primary school:

- The pupils carry out litter picks, an annual beach clean and litter survey for the Marine Conservation Society's Great British Beach Clean. They supported campaigns: Keep Scotland Beautiful's 'Give Your Litter a Lift' and 'My Beach, Your Beach' campaign through litter picking and litter surveys.
- The pupils also help brighten up their local environment and improve biodiversity by planting in two areas of Broughty Ferry: Shiell Street and Queen Street car park. Both projects are registered with the It's Your Neighbourhood scheme.

Share what you are doing, it's a great way to highlight all your good work and inspire others!

What the Neighbourhood Services Team can do to support your Eco-Schools Journey

- Put you in touch with local community groups to work on tackling litter.
- Provide advice for your litter pick (e.g., locations, how to arrange, campaigns you can get involved with).
- Lend equipment for litter picks/clean ups.
- Provide information on the Council's Take Pride in Your City campaign, and how your Eco-school can get involved.
- Help share and promote the excellent work you are doing through the Council's Take Pride in Your City campaign.
- Help support you to create a Litter Prevention Action Plan (LPAP) for your school.
- Provide advice on Keep Scotland Beautiful initiatives such as Clean Up Scotland, Beautiful Scotland, It's Your Neighbourhood, and Upstream Battle on the Tay.

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2. Biodiversity

Maintaining a high level of plant, insect, and animal life locally and globally.

- Nature Scot and the RSPB have lots of free activities and resources to connect children with nature.
- Keep Scotland Beautiful's Learning about Forests (LEAF). LEAF follows the school year and schools can **sign up for August 2024**.
- Keep Scotland Beautiful Natural Scotland Week, offers live lessons and covers biodiversity. Schools can **register here**.
- Managing school grounds for biodiversity can be as simple as asking for an area of grass to be left unmown, to building and planting planters, bug hotels and installing compost bins.
- If you have a woodland area, then bird or bat boxes can be made and put up.
- Keep a record of before and after your project by taking photographs or carrying out a bird or mini-beast survey before and after. This will allow your students to measure and see what difference(s) your project has made.
- Visit a local park, or simply go outside and explore your school grounds by foot; take a survey of the varying types of flora and fauna.
- Become a Hedgehog Friendly School and encourage hedgehogs to explore your school grounds.

What we can do to support your Eco-Schools Journey

- Provide advice on biodiversity within school grounds and the wider city.
- Signpost schools to related biodiversity organisations.
- We can arrange visits from local rangers to teach schools about biodiversity.
- There is the potential to arrange trips for small groups to see examples of biodiversity within Dundee. Or we can provide teacher training sessions.

Local Facts Related to Topic

- Dundee is one of the very few cities in the UK to have its own population of Red Squirrels. If schools have an area of woodland or are close to wooded areas Squirrels can be encouraged to visit.
- Many other threatened species such as hedgehogs, sparrows, starlings, and bats can be found in Dundee and would benefit from action taken in school grounds to support their populations.
- School grounds can help varieties of pollinators by planting nectar rich plants. Case Studies Menzieshill Nursery, Grove Academy, St. Andrew's Primary, Barnhill Nursery, Mill O' Mains Nursery and St. Mary's Primary have installed successful bug hotels, bird feeders and more.
- Urban ReLeaf Dundee a citizen science project, is engaging the community to contribute their observations and perceptions of greenspaces across the city.

3. Climate Action

Climate Action look at all aspects of Climate Breakdown: why and how it affects our daily lives, what the causes are, and how to take action to prevent and reduce the effects of carbon on our environment.

Local Facts Related to Topic

- Lots of work is going on in Dundee to tackle the climate emergency. Did you know?
- Almost 5,000 homes in Dundee have been thermally upgraded, creating warmer homes, reducing fuel bills, and tackling fuel poverty.
- All streetlights have been replaced with LED's which are 90% more efficient than regular lights.
- The V&A Dundee runs solely on geothermal energy, which means heat from within the Earth!
- Electric vehicles (EVs) currently represent over 35% of the council's small van and car fleet.
- The switch to EVs has seen the council travel over 5.6 million miles on pure electric.

4. Energy and Water

These two topics include reducing energy and water use, investigating greener energy sources and look at how clean water is becoming an increasingly rare and valuable commodity.

Local Facts Related to Topic

- Dundee's Education Department took on a target to reduce its energy costs by 10% in 2015/16 through an energy saving campaign. This was supported by the Energy Management section of the Council.
- The target was achieved and has been maintained since then. However, there are still opportunities for further savings in schools.
- Case studies are available from Downfield Primary and Dens Road Primary. A Head Teachers energy saving workshop produced over 100 ideas for actions, which have been compiled into a report.

- Berries are the key local fresh product; James Hutton breeds new cultivars (links to genetics, evolution, nutrition, life cycles, pollinators, climate change, medical drugs from plant sources and more!).
- Kingspark, Rockwell and Claypotts Castle PS now have Polycrubs providing a useful outdoor classroom as well as protected growing space.
- St Mary's Primary have taken over the Whorterbank Tattie Patch; a good example of a raised bed, accessible structure. PEF invested in this case.
- The MAXwell Centre works with local Primary Schools to facilitate growing projects. This is an established project with a strong set of staff and several successful projects e.g., Summer Garden Club.

Case Studies

- King's Park School have raised beds and are planning to install more.
- St Peter and Paul's Primary School has raised beds in their tarmac playground, supported by the MAXwell Centre.

Tips and Ideas

- Become accredited by Cycling Scotland as a Cycling Friendly Primary or Secondary School. Cycling to school brings many positive benefits: keeping children fit and healthy, building their confidence and giving them skills for life.
- Create information posters/leaflets on walking and cycling to get children thinking about alternative, more sustainable transport to school.
- Reinforce the benefits of cycling, walking, and scooting to school such as increasing road safety awareness, saving money, arriving to school alert, boosting mental health & wellbeing, and reducing pollution.
- We can arrange for banners asking parents/ carers etc not to park near the school. These can be attached to the school gates/ fence.
- Encourage exploring Dundee by foot. Dundee has many interesting walking maps available for the whole family.

9. Transport: Decarbonisation

The future of Dundee travel is electric. Moving to sustainable transport choices, reducing the reliance on individual traffic, and participating in public transport is key to a sustainable future.

What we can do to support your Eco-Schools Journey

- A talk/presentation on electric vehicles (EVs), covering where our electricity comes from and the shift from fossil fuel to cleaner & cheaper electric transport.
- Talks on air quality and the health impacts of pollution.
- Bring an EV to the school grounds to compare, explore, and learn more about.
- Provide information on the Drive Dundee Electric campaign with supporting marketing materials and merchandise.
- Provide EV activity sheets i.e., colouring posters for events/classrooms.
- Provide video and drone footage of local EV infrastructure for presentations/talks.

Local Facts Related to Topic

- Since switching to EVs the council travelled over 5.6 million miles on pure electric, saving an estimated 250,000 tons of C02 in the process.
- Dundee has the highest concentration of EVs of any city in the UK. Dundee City Council was the first Local Authority to have over 100 EVs in the fleet.
- Dundee's public EV charging infrastructure includes 37 rapid chargers and 86 fast charging posts so the city can charge approx. 180 vehicles per square mile while the UK can just charge 6.6 vehicles per square mile.
- By 2027 the Council wants to convert 20% of all vehicles to electric, making the city sit at the forefront of EV technology in the UK and Europe.



10. School Grounds

The way school grounds are developed, used, and managed can have a significant impact on pupils' attitudes and behaviour towards school, each other, the wider environment and society.

Tips and Ideas

School grounds can provide opportunities to:

- Devise and build technological solutions for developing alternative energy systems.
- Experiment and build with recycled materials.
- Use organic products and practise organic gardening.
- By providing good facilities such as secure cycle sheds and well-designed access routes, school grounds can also promote sustainable transport – cycling and walking – and should be a consideration within School Travel Plans.
- Design for minimum environmental impact.
- Re-use materials on site and source recycled materials.
- Design and build for the conservation of water resources, consider ponds.
- Use locally sourced materials & local contractors.
- Maximise the positive capacity of the natural environment, including light, shade, ventilation, and micro-climate.
- Make optimal use of green technologies, such as renewable energy and reed bed filtration.
- Appeal to children's intellect and sense of fun with features designed to stimulate their senses and encourage physical and mental exploration.
